Carpark

Once complete, there will be a new carpark, an overflow carpark with grids under the grass to make it drivable in winter, a new entrance, and a dual exit to improve the speed of flow out of the carpark.

Some of you may have also heard about the damage that befell our school hall recently. During the October break our premises team arrived at work to inches of water covering the floor. This caused irreparable damage to the wood, lifting areas into dangerous peaks. We are having the entire hall floor replaced during the Christmas break, this work will continue into January, so please make sure that students pack extra warm clothes in their PE kits, all sports activities will be outside until further notice.

Finally, can I wish all our families a very happy, restful, and blessed Christmas Holiday. Pupils return to school on Wednesday 4 January 2023.

News from the Divinity Department

We are delighted to have received news that the following students are runners up for the 2022 Catholic Young Writer of the Year. Well Done to Jayden, Esme, Max, Georgia and Florence all who are in Year 9. This is the second Year we have entered the competition and come runners up.

Thank you to all our students who took part to produce work of the highest standard on

The Eucharist and why this is so important focusing on the work of St Pope John Paul 11.

To celebrate our Feast of St Martin de Porres who is the Patron Saint of Social Justice, we welcomed Alex Jakeman from City of Leicester Sanctuary and Raj Randhawa from Kick it Out to speak about the work they do on a daily basis helping migrants and refugees and how to stop racism and discrimination in our communities.

For the Feast of St Martin de Porres, Alex (one of the volunteers at Leicester City of Sanctuary) visited our school and gave us a presentation in Divinity on the heart-wrenching reality of the experience many refugees or asylum seekers go through to receive one thing we should all be granted: safety. The Sanctuary meets a multitude of people every week and helps them by making sure they feel welcome, helping them to meet others like them and, above all, they listen to the stories they have to tell. This reminds us of Jesus, and the compassion they show reflects what he once told us, which is to love our neighbours as ourselves.

What are Refugees and Asylum Seekers?

Though many perceive the people who fit these categories to be the same thing, they are not, although they are very closely connected. A refugee is someone who has to flee from their home due to many reasons, commonly war, but also: poverty/hunger, discrimination for things like religion and race and many more things. An asylum seeker is the same, just they have not yet been legally recognised by the government, and this can take an average of three years, and sometimes more. Alex told us that one person had been waiting for 18 years, as he had not been approved by the government to be classified as a refugee. However, his country would not take him back either, leaving him no choice but to stay in England and live of only £5 a day. Sadly, this is a reality for numerous asylum seekers, despite appealing multiple times. Without being recognised, there is no way for them to make money, in fact, it is illegal to do so.

Children Seeking Refuge

Globally, there are a staggering 26 million refugees and the number is on the rise. This number has doubled in the past ten years, which is astonishing and inhumane. What is even more appalling is that over half of these people are children, and some have had to leave their country and journey to a safer place without the help and support of their parents. This number has reached 5000 and to me and many others, this is horrifying. The pure terror these children must feel is unimaginable and is the devastating truth of what these young refugees and asylum seekers have to face. Even the thought of crossing treacherous seas and entering a country where you know no-one, and everyone speaks a language unfamiliar to you is terrifying, let alone having to make the commitment and do it. Just imagine if you were faced with a scenario where you had to leave everything and everyone you know and love behind to escape your country. There is no way to think of the way this must feel for children forced to flee.

What do Leicester City of Sanctuary do to Help?

There can never be enough funding for charities such as these, but there are many ways Leicester City of Sanctuary help the refugees and asylum seekers that regularly cross their path. They run activities such as:

And, of course, they do trips out to a variety of different schools to spread the message about the challenges refugees face on a day-to-day basis.

Football, Trips out English classes Sewing/ Knitting classes, And, of course, they do trips out to a variety of different schools to spread the message about the challenges refugees face on a day-to-day basis.

What Can we do to Help?

In 2020, France and Germany each received almost 120 thousand refugees and asylum seekers and welcomed them, which makes the Uk's 40,000 seem measly. There is no denying that we as a nation, need to do more.

Fortunately, there are things we can do to help Leicester City of Sanctuary, and they involve very little effort. As kids, it's obvious that it would be hard to donate, and that isn't what the Sanctuary want from us. All we have to do is spread the word about refugees and make them feel welcome if we ever see them. Above all, keep an open mind

The sanctuary has a significant role and treat others like Saint Martin treated those around him. He is the patron saint of social justice and if anything, Leicester City of Sanctuary reflects this in their work by being kind, compassionate, caring and treating everyone with respect, just like Martin did. In this case, we are called to break down the unfairness of how refugees are being treated. A quote from Pope Francis states:

"Today is World Day of Migrants and Refugees. Let us renew our commitment to building a future that puts migrants, refugees, displaced persons and victims of human trafficking at the centre. The Kingdom of God is built together with them."

The Leicester City of Sanctuary do this and more, and we should take advice from these words and show it in our everyday lives.— Naomi Year 7 Divinity



On 23rd – 25th November, 66 year 7's went to the Briar's for a retreat. Whilst there we took part in many different activities, including a 'Virtues Catwalk' where each group were given a virtue. With this information they then had to dress one team member up into a walking virtue and think about the qualities that make an individual virtuous.

On Thursday 8th December, the choir were taken out to visit 5 local care homes. The choir sang 4 Christmas carols to the residents. They filled the care home with joy! Songs sung included 'God Rest You Merry Gentlemen' and we rounded off the visit by singing '------'. The students had fun!

On the 13th December, 6 students from the Divinity team went out to the local Lidl to do a food shop for Hinckley food bank. This was then loaded in the minibus and taken to Hinckley foodbank drop-off where the students learned how the food is stored and where it gets delivered to. From the Lidl food shop and the

On Wednesday 14th December, we had our Christmas Masses and liturgies. Our priests, Father Jonathan Cotton and Father Frank, came in to celebrate with us. We also had another special guest, Jean Connor, the lay Chaplain from the local primary schools came and read the bidding prayers which the primary school Chaplaincy team wrote.

Administering Medicines in School

Prescribed medicines may be administered in school (by any of the first aid team) where it is deemed essential. Most prescribed medicines can be taken outside of normal school hours. Wherever possible, the pupil will administer their own medicine, under the supervision of a member of staff. In cases where this is not possible, the staff member will administer the medicine.

If a child refuses to take their medication, staff will accept their decision and inform the parents accordingly. In all cases, we must have written parental permission outlining the type of medicine, dosage and the time the medicine needs to be given. These forms are available in the school office.

Staff will ensure that records are kept of any medication given.

Spare Epi Pens and Inhalers should be kept in the school office. These should be in the original packaging with your child's name on, please ensure that you come in to the school at the start of each term, to check that these are in date and in full working order.

Please note that if your child is due to take part in a school trip or visit and does not have their medication, as listed on the school system (e.g. asthma inhaler) with them, they may not be taken on the trip.

Non-prescribed medicines (Paracetamol / hay fever tablets) will not be held in the school office.

If your child need these type of tablets for cold symptoms, period pain etc they must be responsible for them by keeping them in their blazer or bag. Please ensure they know when to administer their next dose, students will <u>not</u> be supervised by a member of staff when doing this, they should also have water with them .

Please keep the school office up to date with any changes to your child's medical needs.

P=RIODEQUALITY

We believe that period products should be made available to all those who need them in education, as they are a necessity, not a luxury. No-one should be held back from accessing education due to their period.

Last Year the Department for Education (DfE) launched it's 'Period Equality' scheme to provide free period products to young people in schools and colleges across England.

The scheme offers period products, for all who need them, when they need them, in order to access education. Having periods should not be a barrier to education for any learner especially during these financially challenging times

We are remove the stigma and embarrassment that some girls may feel when asking for sanitary products in school and so far we have had an encouraging response. Both the Reception and Girls PE Office have stocks of sanitary pads, tampons and more environmentally-friendly and reusable products, and can provide these to students with the upmost discretion. Not all students may be aware of the scheme and so we will be placing 'Period Equality' posters in the girls toilets notifying them of where they can collect sanitary products from should they need them.

If any parents / carers need support in providing sanitary products while students are at home please speak to the school office, we will be happy to help.

Mobile Phone Policy Phones must be kept in Lockers during the school day

Mobile phones are an integral part of the modern world and we know that the majority of students will own a mobile phone. They are brilliant for parents/carers outside of school so that you can keep in touch with your children at all times. As you know, at Saint Martin's students must turn their mobile phones off once they arrive on school premises and ensure they are placed in their lockers until the end of the day. There is zero tolerance on this, phones will be confiscated for a minimum of 24 hours and must be collected by a parent/ carer. If a student has forgotten their locker key they can hand their phone into the main reception for safekeeping. The responsibility of not getting a phone confiscated lies solely with the student. If you wish not be inconvenienced by having to collect your child's phone, please ensure that they follow the rules.

Reading

One of the primary elements of academic success is how much quality reading a child does each day. We create opportunities throughout the day for pupils to read, 15 minutes most mornings of tutor lead reading of a whole text, as well as a significant amount of reading in literacy-based lessons. I would also urge you as parents and carers to read with your child, either listening to them read, encouraging them to take time each day to read, or even setting the example and having time when the family just switches off the TV to read together. The collective impact of all this reading will dramatically

enhance your child's academic success. Just twenty minutes of reading high-quality text each day can dramatically improve a child's reading age.

In 2018 the Reading Agency conducted a review of similar programmes. An analysis by Kirsch comparing the engaged reading time of 2.2 million students found that –

0-5 mins per day = well below national average

5-14 mins per day = sluggish gains, below national average

15+ mins = accelerated reading gains

20 mins per day = likely score better than 90% of their peers on standardized tests. **National Centre for Education Statistics**





Teagan won a lovely hamper full of art goodies. Well done Teagan, your logo will be displayed on all things 'careers' at Saint Martin's.

Uniform

At Saint Martin's we have the highest expectations regarding school uniform, behaviour and work.ethic and there will be zero tolerance of any non compliance. Where there is pride in appearance and good behaviour, by implication, there is a positive attitude to learning. If a student chooses not to adhere to our School Uniform Policy then sanctions will apply. Which can include afterschool detentions and inclusions. Our uniform unites all members of the community and therefore must be adhered to by all members of the community.

If you have any queries regarding uniform purchases or choices please contact the school office.

May we remind all parents/carers and students of the following:

- Shirts must be tucked in at all times and ALL buttons fully fastened.
- Ties done up properly.
- Skirts must be knee length
- Trousers cannot be skinny fit.
- Blazers are always worn, unless permission is given to remove it.
- Jewellery of any description may not be worn in school, including earrings. This rule applies to girls and boys. Watches may be worn.
- Extremes of hairstyle, including unnatural colours or shaved sides, are not permitted. The Principal will be the final arbiter of what counts as 'extreme'.
- Make-up (including thick eye brows) or nail varnish must not be worn in school. If make-up or nail varnish is used, students will be asked to remove it. False, acrylic, or gel nails are not allowed for health and safety reasons.

Sanctions

As a parent / carer of a Saint Martin's students we have appreciated your full support in maintaining exceptional standards of behaviour by ensuring your child understands and adheres to all of our school rules and policies. Any sanctions that occur from poor behaviour, lacking equipment, incorrect uniform etc. are the sole

responsibility of the students. There is no option to opt out of after school detentions, whether they be same night or next day, if this sanction is used. Saint Martin's also holds no responsibility for getting students home if we put them in detention as per Section 5 of the 1997 Education Act in choosing a school that uses this form of sanction you are agreeing to support its use when deemed necessary.

Social media use

The majority of our students equally have social media accounts (despite most having a minimum age of 13) so we must also advise acceptable use of all social media platforms. The school offers lots of advice on E-Safety and we would ask parents/carers to check your child's internet use regularly to ensure that they are not putting themselves at risk. Cyberbullying has become an issue nationally since the mergence of Social Media and the school will not tolerate unpleasant behaviour of any kind towards our students. Whether in school or not, the school can and will impart sanctions if a member of our community found to cvberbullving. Please contact a member of staff if you have any concerns.
